



FIVE THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT VOTING IN 2006

BEFORE YOU VOTE

Many registration systems and laws have changed in 2006.

1. *Am I registered?* Contact your local elections office to make sure. Two resources can help you connect: **1-866-MY-VOTE-1** or **www.CommonCause.org/election2006**

AT THE POLLS

Poll workers are there to help. Many polling places have new machines. Ask for assistance if you need it. Whatever you do, don't leave without casting a ballot.

4. *What if my name isn't on the voter rolls?* If you're sure you are registered, vote on a provisional ballot and check back the next day to make sure your vote was counted.

5. *How do I know if the machine worked correctly?* If it prints a paper record of your vote, check the paper carefully. If the voting machine or printer isn't working correctly, tell a poll worker immediately. Ask to use a different machine or cast an emergency paper ballot (do *not* cast a provisional ballot).
