

**Elected Official & Cabinet Secretary Lobbying**

**Senate Executive Message No. 16 and House Executive Message No. 7 by Governor Susana Martinez  
Senate Bill 96 sponsored by Senator Bill O’Neill and Representative Mimi Stewart, AND  
House Bill 82 sponsored by Representative Emily Kane**

- Both bills prohibit former statewide elected officials, public regulation commissioners, state legislators and cabinet secretaries from accepting compensation as lobbyists for a period of two years after their service.
- New Mexico legislators could improve public confidence in the integrity of state government by enacting this two-year waiting period before former elected officials and others can become lobbyists.
- Approximately twenty-six former legislators currently lobby the New Mexico state legislature.
- At least 31 states have enacted a “cooling-off period” before a former legislator can come back to work at the legislature as a lobbyist. Also known as revolving door laws, eight states – Alabama, Colorado, Florida, Iowa, Kentucky, Louisiana, Montana, and New York – ban former legislators for two years.
- A poll was conducted with a random sample of 467 registered New Mexico voters between December 20th, 2013 and January 2nd, 2014 to ask if they supported this bill.
- **Seventy-eight percent (78%) of the voters surveyed support requiring former legislators to wait at least two years after their term ends before they are able to become paid lobbyists to the legislature.**
