

Fighting Big Money, Empowering People: An Oregon Agenda

As Oregonians, we share a strong tradition of independent government run of, by and for the people. We expect our government to serve us based on the consent of the governed, with voters, not money, driving decisions. We will not stand by and allow the corrosive influence of big money in politics and the corrupting force of partisan politics to go unchecked, drowning out the voice of the people and undermining confidence in government. We expect leadership that puts voters back at the center of our democracy.

Oregon lawmakers should commit to these five principles of democracy:

1. Everyone participates;
2. Everyone’s voice is heard;
3. Everyone knows who is trying to influence our views and our representatives;
4. Everyone plays by fair, common-sense rules;
5. Everyone is held accountable, with enforceable penalties to deter bad behavior.

COMMENT

I have worked very hard on campaign finance reform, and there is more to do. I am dedicated to continuing this work as a state legislator.

Limit influence: The subsequent resolution to an appropriate upper limit should be reached with extensive public involvement, and not a legislative “quick fix.”

Public financing: With revenue inadequate to fund quality public education, protect vulnerable Oregonians, and meet goals for safe communities and clean environment, implementation will depend on cost and how it fits in the budget.

Transparency: My bill to eliminate “gray money” was the only campaign finance reform bill in 2015 to gain a public hearing. I secured bipartisan, bicameral co-sponsors and consulted with attorneys and interest groups as I developed the bill.

Gerrymandering: I oppose redistricting that intentionally separates communities for other political purposes. The legislative bi-partisan redistricting process in 2011 included public hearings and saved taxpayer money due to not needing to fight appeals; the process resulted in a fair outcome with sensibly drawn boundaries.
