3. Everyone knows who is trying to influence our views and our representatives;
4. Everyone plays by fair, common-sense rules;
5. Everyone is held accountable, with enforceable penalties to deter bad behavior.

COMMENT

Growing up in a Martial Law/dictatorship regime, I lost almost all my rights, including freedom of speech, freedom of the press, freedom to gather and most especially the right to vote. I did not get to vote until I was 26 years old. As the Philippines struggled to get out of the corrupted and repressive remnants of the dictatorship, election periods saw massive fraud, vote-buying, falsification of voters' names and documents, vote-rigging, tampering of ballots, switching of ballot boxes, manipulating software systems to affect the tally of votes, and voters' fraud, resulting in disenfranchisement of registered voters and opening the election process to manipulation. Without proper identification, the election process fell prey to abuse.

I understand that additional steps to take to prevent voters' fraud might be frustrating but I believe that it is all worth it to ensure that we continue to have clean elections, protecting the integrity of the process. For those who truly believe that it is important to protect the integrity of the voting process, supporting what we need to do to secure our votes is a very special responsibility. It is a clear reminder for me that I can now trust the process that I participate in.

Immigrants like me relocate here in the US because we aspire to live in a country where the Law and Constitution are respected, where no one is above the Law, where no one is exempt, where all of us accept the responsibilities of being citizens here in our second home.
