November 2022 ballot question "translations" per A10708 requirements

Voters outside of New York City will vote on 1 ballot measure this year which is the Environmental Bond Act. In New York City, voters will have three additional ballot measures to approve.

What's in this document?

Each table column has a version of a ballot question. The first column contains the measure as it will appear on the November 8, 2022 ballot. The second column contains a plain language version of the same measure which follows the requirements of Assembly Bill 10708 prepared by Common Cause/NY and the Center for Civic Design. There are "stats" in the bottom row of each table. The stats row shows whether each requirement of the bill is met or violated. Violations are indicated with an asterisk.

We used <u>Hemingway</u> to calculate Automated Readability Index (ARI). We show an ARI grade level for the entire text including the title, and another ARI grade level for only the text.

Passives are highlighted in green and semicolons are highlighted in red. There were no double negatives in any version.

What does the bill require?

- Must score 8th grade/good or higher on ARI
- One passive sentence or fewer
- Avoids semi colons, using multiple sentences as necessary
- No double negatives
- Descriptive title with 15 words or less that describes the topic, goal, or outcome
- Ballot text of 30 words or less in "clear, concise, plain language" (ARI requirement repeated here)
- Plain Language statement of what yes or no means that describes the practical results and not the legal mechanism (30 words or less).
- Fiscal statement when required (25 words or less)
