

# SURVEY OF NORTH CAROLINA VOTERS for COMMON CAUSE NORTH CAROLINA

n=671 REGISTERED VOTERS MoE=±3.8% FIELDED: SEPT 15-17, 2025

The survey was fielded September 15 to 17, 2025. Potential respondents were randomly selected from a database of North Carolina voters and contacted via either a live-operator phone call or an SMS message that led to a web-based survey. The hyperlink in each SMS contained a nine-character alphanumeric unique identifier to ensure the survey could only be taken a single time by a single person using that link. Respondents were screened to ensure they were registered North Carolina Voters. Results were weighted using an iterative proportional fitting process to match the known attributes of the North Carolina registered electorate on the variables of gender, age, ethnicity, educational attainment, geographic area, and political party affiliation. This weighting model was created using data sourced from the North Carolina State Board of Elections as well as the United States Census Bureau American Community Survey Public Use Microdata. The final sample of qualified respondents is n=671 registered voters, and the survey has a margin of error of ±3.8% with 95% confidence. The survey was commissioned by Common Cause North Carolina.

**RE:** Survey of North Carolina Registered Voters

### **KEY FINDINGS**

Across all three measures tested—Sunday voting, early-voting sites on college campuses, and same-day registration—North Carolina voters show broad, bipartisan support for expanding access to the ballot. Support is consistently high across gender, race, and region, and even among groups often more skeptical of election reforms. Younger voters express the strongest support, though majorities of older voters back each policy as well. Black and white voters support all three measures by wide margins, with especially strong support among Black respondents. Notably, even voters who strongly disapprove of Governor Stein or who strongly approve of the General Assembly still register net positive support for each policy. The only meaningful exception in the data is eastern North Carolina's narrow one-point opposition to same-day registration; all other groups and regions show broad agreement.

# **APPROVAL RATINGS:**

As is the case at the federal level, North Carolina's chief executive has a higher approval rating than the legislative branch.

Governor Josh Stein is viewed positively, with 54 percent approving and 23 percent disapproving (net +31).

Partisan Margins: Democrats +69, Republicans -2, Unaffiliated +26.

The North Carolina Legislature earns 31 percent approval and 39 percent disapproval (net -9).

Partisan Margins: Democrats -31, Republicans +26, Unaffiliated -18.

The North Carolina Supreme Court is more mixed, with 32 percent favorable and 38 percent unfavorable (net −6).

Partisan Margins: Democrats -49, Republicans +48, Unaffiliated −15.

 Among the 26% of voters who strongly approve of Governor Stein, the Supreme Court is viewed very negatively (net -45).

# **VOTING ACCESS**

Sunday voting is popular with voters. Seventy-four percent support it, while 20 percent oppose (net +54).

Partisan Margins: Democrats +80, Republicans +18, Unaffiliated +61.

- The highest support for Sunday voting comes from those aged 18-34 (+75), while the lowest level of support, though still strong, comes from those over 65 years old (+28)
- Charlotte, Greensboro, Raleigh, and western North Carolina respondents support Sunday voting by margins exceeding +50; eastern North Carolina support is lower, but still at +35.
- Black (+54) and white (+60) voters support Sunday voting at similar levels.
- Those who "strongly approve" of Stein support Sunday voting by 85 points, while those who "strongly disapprove" of Stein still support Sunday voting by 19 points.
- Respondents who "strongly approve" of the North Carolina General Assembly support Sunday voting by 42 points.

Early voting sites on college campuses also enjoy broad support. Seventy-nine percent support, while 16 percent oppose (net +64).

Partisan Margins: Democrats +84, Republicans +41, Unaffiliated +65.

- Support is the highest among voters aged 18-34 (+88). The lowest support by age group comes from those 65 years older, though still at +34.
- Support is especially strong in Greensboro (+72) and Charlotte (+70).
- Black voters support early voting on college campuses by the highest margin of +82, though white voters still support this by 59 points.
- Those who "strongly approve" of Stein support early voting on college campuses by 91 points. EV on college campuses is still up by 17 points among those who "strongly disapprove" of Stein.
- Respondents who "strongly approve" of the North Carolina General Assembly support early voting on college campuses by 36 points.
