1. Can you fill a signature block and sign your own petition booklet?
2. Who can sign for another person?
3. The signer has a PO box and has moved recently. What address should they use?
4. When and where should I turn in completed voter registration forms?
5. What should I do when someone makes a small mistake when completing their address?
6. Is it helpful to pre-plan what I'm going to say when I ask people to sign?
7. What should I do if someone says they want more info before signing?
8. Where can I find the text of the amendment?
9. What do I do if someone says we already tried to end gerrymandering?
10. What part of the form can I fill out for someone who wants to sign?
11. Can I leave my petition at the corner coffee shop on the counter while I run errands? What about in a secure tub on my front porch?
12. After I fill out the back page (statement of circulator), can I go back and change the number of signatures I had previously written?
13. If someone signs the petition twice with two different people, does that mean their signature counts twice?
14. Can people who live in different counties sign the same petition booklet?
15. If I won't be able to get enough signatures for a particular county in a timely manner, can I pass my booklet on to someone else to finish up?
16. What should I do if the regional leader asks me to return my petition booklets but mine are not yet full?
17. When completing the statement of circulator, should I count signature blocks that are crossed out?
18. Is it better to have an undercount, an overcount, or an exact count when completing the statement of circulator?
19. Is it allowed to pre-fill the county block in my booklets?
20. What is good advice to give in regards to whether or not to include a middle initial and how to sign?

Circulator Quiz Answers

1. No, signing your own booklet is not allowed and will invalidate at least your own signature.
2. No one can sign for another person.
3. They must use their CURRENT street address & update their voter registration to match.
4. Turn in completed VR forms according to instructions from your regional lead.
5. Have the person signing correct the error neatly and initial the correction. OR, cross out the signature block and start again.
6. Yes, please pre-plan your opening line! A good one is, "Do you want to sign to end gerrymandering?"
7. Send them to CitizensNotPoliticians.org (show the link and QR code on the inside of the clipboard).
8. You can find the exact text of the amendment in your petition booklet.
9. Talk about the fact this will put CITIZENS, not politicians in charge. If they just want to debate, it's fine to politely end the conversation and move away.
10. You can fill out all the information EXCEPT the signature.
11. No, don't leave your petition booklet(s) unattended. You must witness each signature.
12. Preferably count correctly the first time, but if needed, carefully correct and initial.
13. The signature will only count once.
14. People who live in different counties must sign petition booklets specific to their county.
15. No, you cannot have two people collect signatures on one petition booklet.
16. Return your books even if they are not full.
17. No, do not count signature blocks that are crossed out.
18. A correct count is the best! Have someone double check your count when you turn in your booklets.
19. Yes, you can pre-fill the county. Another tip is to put a small Post-It note with the county name at the top of the signature page you are on in that booklet.
20. Do what is on your driver's license!
